
Charles and Esther Puckering

Transcription of obituary published in the Primitive Methodist Magazine by William Pickering

In the year 1865 a few Primitive Methodists formed a society in the village of Lanchester, eight miles from Durham city, and within a few days Charles Puckering settled in the place. He attached himself to the infant cause, and speedily became its leading spirit. For over forty years our brother served as a local preacher, Sunday school teacher; and.class«leader. It was a great joy that he lived to celebrate the jubilee of his membership at last December Quarterly Meeting. On May 13th; 1916, after a brief illness, he passed away at the age of seventy-three,
