

HULL CIRCUIT. _ Extract from G. Herod's Journal

SATURDAY January 19. We held a prayer meeting in York chapel. We had a powerful time many were labouring under convictions. Monday 21. We held a prayer meeting in York; one soul got liberty. Friday 25. I preached in York, and held prayer meeting. Fourteen of us then made a covenant to pray for a revival; we were to meet at the throne of grace every morning at five o'clock, at nine, at twelve, at four, and at half-past nine at night They seemed to be in earnest for a revival.

Wednesday February 6.. This morning I visited a sick woman, who appeared to be nigh to death. I spoke to her concerning her soul but found her a stranger to the blood that bought her pardon on the tree. After showing her the necessity of being born again, I prayed with her, and the Spirit of God wrought so powerfully on her mind that she began to cry for mercy. After much wrestling with God, she stated, God had made her happy in his love. I then went and had a short prayer meeting, and the power of God came down; one began to cry to God to save her soul. At night I preached at Strensall; one soul got liberty, another cried for mercy.

Sunday February 17 I preached at Lilin, a new place. At two at Strensall, at six at Sheriff Hutton and held a prayer meeting; many were labouring under convictions. One soul got liberty.

Sunday 24. I preached at Easingwold at ten, and gave the sacrament. At one the lovefeast began. The people spoke with liberty. When the speaking was closed, I went and spoke to some who had seemed to have come in out of curiosity. I found some of them had come to get good, number were in distress; we held prayer meeting; five souls got liberty, and two got clean hearts; but some went away in distress.

Tuesday 26, I preached at Tollerton, and held a prayer meeting, one soul began to cry out for mercy; the power of God came down, and five souls got liberty.

Thursday 28. Visited the members, and God Was with me; two souls got liberty, and one got a clean heart.
