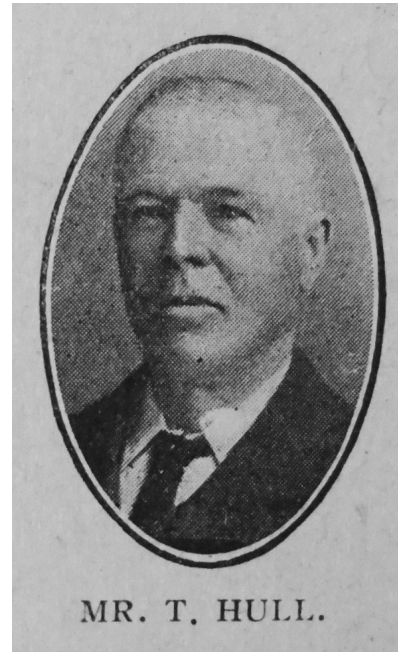


Thomas Hull

Transcription of Obituary In the Primitive Methodist Magazine by H.P.

Thomas Hull, of Consett, entered the higher service on September 23rd, 1916. He was a striking and interesting character possessed of great natural endowment, and had a dominating personality. He was converted under the ministry of the late Rev. Thomas Greenfield fifty years ago. He was an acceptable local preacher. When he began he was unable to read, but memorised the 14th chapter of John by his wife reading the chapter over to him. He was greatly influenced at this period by the Rev. T. Southron and Rev. A. Latimer. He took a prominent part in the administration of the Shotley Bridge Circuit; in fact, was one of the pioneers. He was brusque in manner and outspoken in speech, but he had the heart of a child. He was a generous supporter of his Church. He even expressed the wish that when he died he might be buried by the side of the pulpit in the old Consett Church. He was a loving husband, kind father, and a good Christian man.
