DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN TINGLEY RESIDENT.

MR. EDWARD HUGHES.

Deep regret was expressed throughout West Ardsley on Saturday last when the news was received of the death at Leeds Infirmary of Mr. Edward Hughes, of Blackgates, Tingley. Known throughout West Ardsley affectionately as "Teddy," deceased came to Tingley over half a century ago from Wales, and soon identified himself with the Primitive Methodists of Tingley, practically having held every possible office. He took a deep interest in the Sunday school and young people, and although 73 years of age had a youthful, progressive and vigorous spirit. He was a life-long Liberal, and never wavered in his loyalty and allegi-ance to Liberalism. He also took a great interest in the well-being of the com-munity of West Ardsley, and especially was this manifest during the coal strikes of 1921 and 1926. He was taken to the Leeds General Infirmary for an operation for appendicitis, and was making a good recovery when complications set in. The funeral on Monday afternoon was very impressive. Revs. A. Naylor (superintendent minister) and S. L. Lane, of Morley, were present, as was also the Rev. G. Hunt, of Leeds. The Sunday school was well represented, nearly all scholars, teachers and officials attending, as well as a large number of members and adherents of Zion, in addition to local inhabitants anxious to pay their last tribute of respect to one so highly esteemed. The service was held in the Zion P.M. Chapel and the interment took place at Woodkirk. Many floral tributes were sent, and blinds en route were drawn. Deceased is survived by a son and daughter.
