

### CHAPEL OPENINGS

*Allenheads* is a village situated in the south or south-west extremity of Northumberland. Lead ore is found in this part; and a goodly number of the inhabitants are employed, some in digging it out of the earth, and others in clearing it, and taking off the silver.

This place was visited by the Primitive Methodists about eighteen years ago, and a small society formed, who have encountered serious trials; but “the Lion of the tribe of Judah” has opened their way, for which they feel thankful.

Various efforts were made to obtain land for a chapel, but without success. But at length the Lord opened our way to obtain three dwelling-houses, which are converted into a neat and suitable chapel. Brother Wilson, superintendent preacher, has been attentive to getting trustees, and consulting with the attorney about the deeds, &c.; and it is settled on the Connexion. This chapel has eight elevated pews, seating about eighty people, besides the free sittings. It was opened for divine worship on Sunday, August 29, 1841, by W. Lonsdale, from Bradford, and J. Burroughs, of our own circuit.

Great credit is due to the trustees for their perseverance in begging; and they also acknowledge their obligations to the contributors to this house of the Lord. Souls are getting converted, and both chapel and society are likely to do well. To God be all the glory.
